## **Learning Research Methods through Peer-Teaching and Workshops (FAIRFIELD • 1:00PM)**

This panel session will assess the practices and effectiveness of a graduate-level critical research methods course that incorporates in its curriculum peer targeted workshops and undergraduate coaching conducted by the course's graduate students.
